
Roundtable on Inclusion

In April, the 2nd Roundtable on Inclusion event brought together community stakeholders, policymakers, corporate partners, and members of the academic community for a day of presentations, panels, and open discussions on outcomes from the recent National Conference on Disability and Work in Canada, facilitating disability inclusion in NL private and public sector workplaces, NL work disability policy in action, return-to-work processes for people with disabilities and pathways for future positive change. Employment for those with cognitive impairments was discussed a number of times.

Autism Panel Discussion

On May 2 the Autism Society of NL organized a panel discussion hosted by Anthony Germain of CBC to discuss residential options for those on the autism spectrum. I, as well as Petra and David, attended the panel discussion. The panelists included a mother, an aunt, a woman on the spectrum, an autism professional and a housing advocate.

The mother and aunt spoke about the difficulties experienced when a family member is diagnosed as being on the autism spectrum. This included identifying available medical services as well as options for appropriate living accommodations. The woman on the autism spectrum spoke about issues around diagnosis and the need for services to assist with daily living. The woman, who has a high intelligence quotient, indicated that those in similar circumstances often have a lower emotional or social quotient for which they need ongoing assistance. This would include issues such as financial management and transportation. The housing advocate, Bruce Pearce of End Homelessness St. John's, talked about the housing options which are presently available as well as new options being considered going forward. The autism professional commented with conviction that, in addition to family members and government, the community as a whole has an obligation to become involved in the care of those on the autism spectrum, including those with intellectual disabilities. The Autism Society indicated it intends to continue to engage government on behalf of those on the
